

Ohio Dominican University Celebrates 175th Anniversary of the Dominican Sisters of St. Mary of the Springs. The beautiful spring like day on February 15, 2005 added to the joyful and blessed rolling celebration of the Springs Dominicans at Ohio Dominican University. The university community gathered with many of the sisters in the area to mark this important event. A prayer service was held in Christ the King Chapel of Sansbury Hall. Dr. Jack Calareso welcomed all to the event and Sr. Anne Kilbride gave a greeting of gratitude on behalf of the sisters,

The prayer service opened with the singing of "Women of Vision," to the tune of "Morning Has Broken." A procession included the presentation of symbols with commentary that included the scriptures, congregational mission statement, statue of Dominic the itinerant preacher, picture of Catherine of Siena, and a listing of the names of over 170 sisters who had served at the university. Brief excerpts of the history of the Springs Dominicans were read by ODU faculty. These comments were followed by congregational responses that included: "Women of vision we honor you, celebrate your itinerant spirit and look to you for inspiration." A highlight of the event was the reflection given by President Emeritus, Sr. Mary Andrew Matesich, O.P., who framed her comments around the reading from Isaiah 52:7-10. ("How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of one who brings glad tidings...") Mary Andrew's inspiring reflections reminded all of the courage, faith and hope manifested in the pioneer sisters. A solemn reading of the names of the 170 sisters who had served at Ohio Dominican followed with the presentation of clusters of jonquils. Closing intercessions concluded with the joyful singing of "Family of Dominic." A joyous reception followed.

A formal opening of the Dominican Lecture Series sponsored by The Center for Dominican Studies took place on February 10, 2005. Fr. Donal Goergen, O.P., theologian, lecturer, teacher and author addressed the assembly on the topic "Challenges for Colleges and Universities in the New Millennium: A Dominican Perspective."

Fr. Goergen's scholarly and inspiring words set the tone for an interesting and thought provoking discussion led by the responding panel that included Dr. Karen Holbrook, Regent Thomas Noe and Dr. Jack Calareso.

Some questioned posed by Fr. Goergen to the audience included: Do you seek the Truth? Do you love the Truth? What understanding of Truth does your college or university hand on? Does our education prepare us in both scholarly and practical pursuits but also enable us to live more mindful, contemplative, caring lives? Is there nourishment for the soul as well as for the mind and an integration of the two? Are we concerned not only with what we can or will do but with who we become?

In addition to this work, Sr. Noffke is noted for her translations and interpretations of the works of Catherine of Siena. She is a Scholar in Residence with the Department of History at the University of Wisconsin-Parkside.
